



This Washington Post-Schar School poll was conducted by telephone Oct. 20-26, 2021, among a random sample of 1,209 adults in Virginia, including subsamples of 1,107 registered voters and 918 likely voters. The sample was drawn from a combination of voter registration-based sampling and random sampling of Virginia phone numbers. Overall, 73 percent of respondents were reached on cellphones and 27 percent on landlines. Sampling, data collection and tabulation by Abt Associates of Rockville, Md.

This poll was jointly sponsored and funded by The Washington Post and the George Mason University Schar School of Policy and Government. The poll includes interviews in English and Spanish and is a random sample of Virginia adult residents.

A total of 326 interviews were completed using dual frame Random Digit Dialing (RDD) procedures of landline and cellular phones in Virginia. The remaining 883 interviews were completed by sampling from a database of Virginia registered voters maintained by Aristotle, Inc., in which voters have been matched to landline and cellular phone numbers, including phones with out-of-state area codes. The sample frames were deduplicated, such that phone numbers existing on the voter list frame were not eligible for selection through the RDD frame. The total sample included 331 interviews on landlines and 878 interviews completed via cellular phones, including 611 interviews with adults in cell phone-only households.

In the RDD sample, interviewers calling landline phone numbers first requested to speak with the youngest adult male or female at home, while on cellphones interviewers asked screening questions on age and state residency of the person answering the phone. In the voter file sample, interviewers calling landlines asked for respondents' names to be confirmed or matched to the voter file. Voter-file respondents reached on cellphones were interviewed if they confirmed they were registered to vote in Virginia. For cell voter-file interviews, where a voter did not confirm the name on the database, as well for all RDD interviews with registered voters, Abt Associates attempted to match respondents to the Aristotle database after data collection.

This survey uses statistical weighting procedures to account for characteristics of the sample design and deviations in the survey sample from known population characteristics, which helps correct for differential survey participation and random variation in samples.

Weights correct for differential probability of selection for landline-only, cell phone-only and dual phone users. Results are also weighted to match the demographic makeup of the population, as detailed in the table below. The sample of registered voters who were matched to the Aristotle voter file (75 percent) were weighted to match the distribution of all voters on a measure of inferred partisanship, which is based on voters' participation in partisan primaries, political donations and other indicators. In the survey, 79 percent of voters classified as inferred Democrats said they identified or leaned Democratic, while 80 percent of those classified as inferred Republicans.

This questionnaire was administered with the exact questions in the exact order as they appear in this document. Voter registration and demographics and religious identity questions are not displayed. If a question was asked of a reduced base of the sample, a parenthetical preceding the question identifies the group asked. Phrases surrounded by parentheticals within questions indicate clauses that were randomly rotated for respondents. Results preceded by "RV" indicate results among registered voters, with "LV" indicating likely voters and other results are among adults overall.

All error margins have been adjusted to account for the survey's design effect, which is 1.6 for this survey. The design effect is a factor representing the survey's deviation from a simple random sample and takes into account decreases in precision due to sample design and weighting procedures. Surveys that do not incorporate a design effect overstate their precision.
